2013 was a wonderful year of celebration for Golders Green Meeting as we marked our centenary. After much planning, eight events took place throughout the year, as well as our traditional Christmas Party which featured spoken and musical contributions including from our young people. A History of our Meeting, our Meeting House and a profile of Lisa Shend'ge were published in *Suburb News*.

Our first centenary event was a public talk in March given by Liz Scurfield and Martina Weitsch on their work at QCEA. This was followed in April by a 'Meet the Quakers – Past and Present' which celebrated earlier Friends of Golders Green as well as the work of current Friends. In June, Annetta Hoffnung gave a presentation on the cartoons of Gerard Hoffnung. Our other summer event was a tea party to which former Members of the

Meeting were invited. The weather was lovely so many

enjoyed being in the garden before tea took place in the Meeting

House, with birthday cakes for two current Friends celebrating their ninetieth birthdays. On sale at this event were the beautiful postcards printed from photographs taken by Bing Xiao. In September, the annual Open House took place. Then, in October, the Meeting for Worship was held which celebrated exactly one hundred years since the first such was held in the Meeting House. As with all our centenary events, this was well attended. Finally, Golders Green hosted the Quaker Service Memorial Trust exhibition in November.

Our centenary events have drawn former Friends back to the Meeting House where they have shared memories with each other and with current Friends. It has been a time of working closely together by our 21 Members and 14 active Attenders to arrange and host the events, involving our 5 young people wherever possible,

thereby strengthening our Meeting.

Centenary Lecture

On 3 March, Martina Weitsch and Liz Scurfield, longstanding Members of the Meeting who had recently returned after 10 years' service as Representatives at the Quaker Council for European Affairs, gave a public talk to get the year's celebrations under way.

Under the title: Peace, Justice and Solidary - Europe: A Work in Progress, Liz and Martina took us on a whistle stop tour of some of the key facts and figures relating to the European Union and then described

with the help of two case studies the detailed and meticulous work they did to influence decision-makers to bring peace, justice and solidarity centre stage in European policy decisions - in justice and foreign policy matters in this case.

Brenda Bailey, herself a Quaker Representative at the Quaker UN Office in New York in earlier times, said: *'They spoke appreciatively of the groups of European Quakers, and getting some of them into their Management Committee. They must have made our Quaker reputation shine again. The Meeting House was full, as I haven't seen it for years. Every chair was taken. They even had to bring down all the chairs from upstairs. The participants appreciated hearing more about the EU and the Common Market, because we are all so ignorant.'*

The Meeting was gently and effectively chaired by Diktyнна Warren. Contrary to usual Quaker custom she said we might applaud if we wanted to... great relief from Meeting... We did applaud after a rather good point was made by one of the speakers and very enthusiastically at the end.

Afterwards, there was a chance for a great deal of enthusiastic conversation. There were the usual sumptuous refreshments and a collection was taken, raising just over £ 200 for the work of the Quaker Council for European Affairs in Brussels.



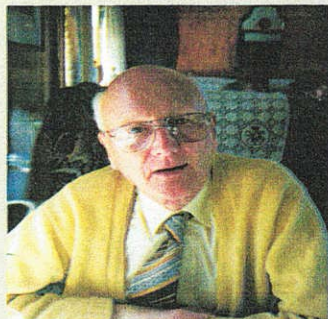
Just in time for the public talk on 3 March, we unveiled the Centenary Banner, which highlighted our presence in this corner of Central Square in Hampstead Garden Suburb

Gerard Hoffnung's Cartoons celebrated

Gerard Hoffnung (1925 - 1959) was not only a Member of Golders Green Meeting, he was much better known for his musical drawings and his broadcasts. After his untimely death at the age of 34, his obituary in the Times said:

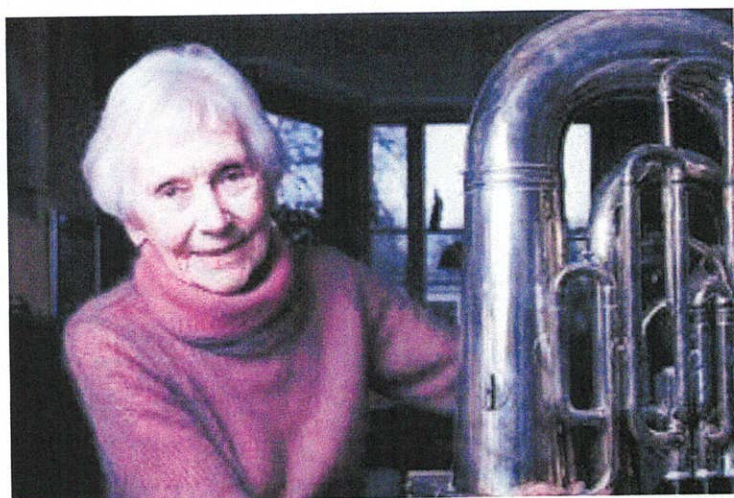


'Hoffnung was among other things an artist, a musician, a linguist, a raconteur, a Quaker, a bon viveur, a prison visitor and a mime. It is usual to say that a man has left behind a gap that cannot be filled. For Gerard Hoffnung there would be needed a handful of men, all of them greatly gifted.'

His widow has continued to be member of our Meeting and we were delighted to have an

afternoon with her and her very memorable reflection on his life and work on 9 June.

Both their children, Ben and Emily, a Member of our Meeting, spent the afternoon with us.



We very much enjoyed being reminded of some of his broadcasts on 'One Minute Please', the 'Hoffnung Music Festival' at the Royal Festival Hall in 1956, and his many musical drawings.

We were happy to be joined by past members and attenders from Meetings far and wide, as well as local residents of Hampstead Garden Suburb, including the vicar of St Jude's and the Free Church minister. It was an event that was nicely informal but with all the benefits of thorough and creative planning. Thanks to the warm summer weather on that day, we were able to gather in the pleasant grounds of the Meeting House for the earlier part of the afternoon, and taste the fine fruit punch that was perfect for the occasion. Meanwhile indoors, a banquet table was laden with a large variety of cakes, many of which were homemade, plus strawberries and cream, and various 'nibbles', which we later enjoyed with our tea in the intimate setting of tables for four set with lace cloths and flowers.



All were treated to a well-rehearsed concert organised by our own Sue Rothstein, a professional harpist, with solos, duos and ensemble pieces played on recorders, harp and piano, as well as a charming violin solo from one of our young attenders, and culminating in a repeat of two of the ensemble pieces this time with audience participation.



The afternoon was nicely rounded off with more tea, cakes and socialising, and will for me no doubt endure as one of the fondest of many fond memories of my first year as an attender.

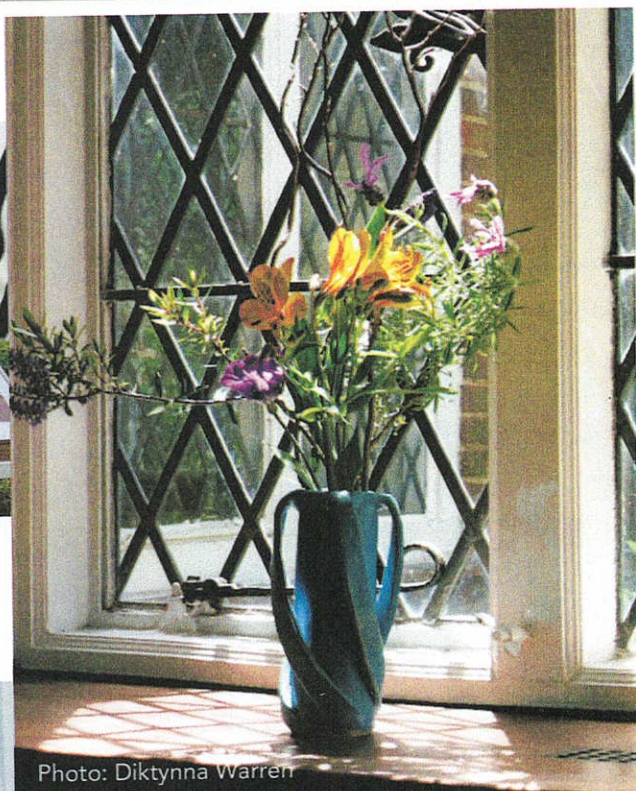

OPEN HOUSE at the Meeting House 22nd September

The Meeting House is one of several buildings in the Borough of Barnet to open during the weekend, this year September 21st and 22nd. We have always limited our hours of opening to Sunday between 2 and 5pm.

The Open House weekend now called Open City, is of course an architectural initiative "celebrating architecture, people and place" With this in mind our hand out sheet introduces our visitors to the architect Fred Rowntree pointing out his inspiration taken from Friends Meeting House at Jordan's when designing the Golders Green building.



Our visitors are often intrigued to discover that in addition to other buildings in the area Rowntree and Sons were selected by competition to design buildings for the University of Chengdu in western China which also happens to be the university attended by Bing Xiao a member of Golders Green meeting. Bing has produced a poster detailing illustrations of her university, Jordan's Meeting House together with a portrait of Fred Rowntree.

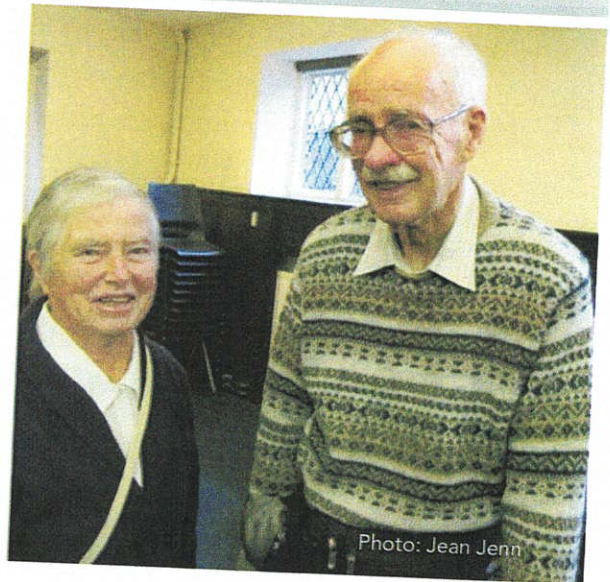
Visitors are greeted by one of the members or attenders, usually about five to six volunteer to spend an hour or two during the afternoon. Refreshments are offered and the layout of the building explained. We do not conduct tours preferring to allow free access to other rooms and being available for questions and comments. The main meeting room is arranged as a Meeting for Worship with Quaker leaflets and magazines on display in the entrance hall. There are often questions about Quaker belief and how Meeting is conducted, Many comment on the simplicity of the building and appreciate the quiet of its woodland setting, contrasting this with the large Lutyens churches nearby.

In 2012 it poured with rain all day discouraging many visitors. This year the weather was fine and sunny and according to our visitors book fifty-four people visited the building, reports Sonia Mathias.

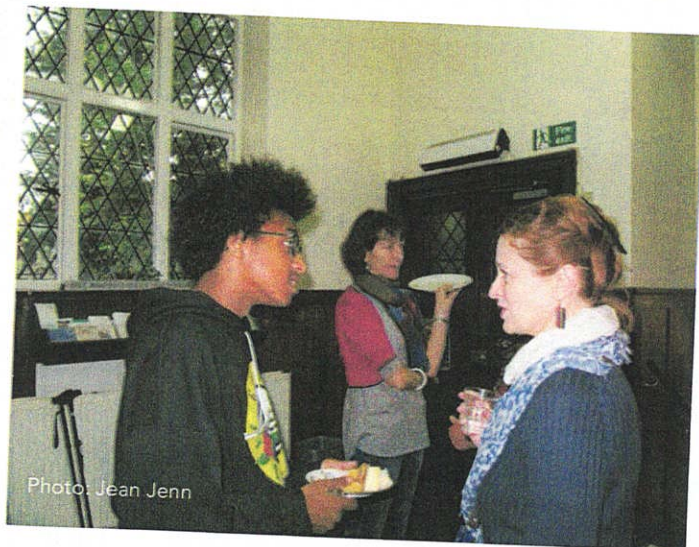
100 Years ago to the day the first Meeting for Worship took place in this room - 100 Years on we gave thanks

We were reminded of the future, with our young Friends now attending Friends Summer School and Senior Conference. Their faith may be spoken in a different language but the depth of attentive



listening in the silence, which nurtures the vine in them and us, will provide vigorous growth in their lives and service.

The clerk gave a warm welcome to all. Then the delicious lunch was served. Thanks to all who contributed to the generous spread on the tables.

Conversations flowed, memories were shared, and displayed photos were scanned!

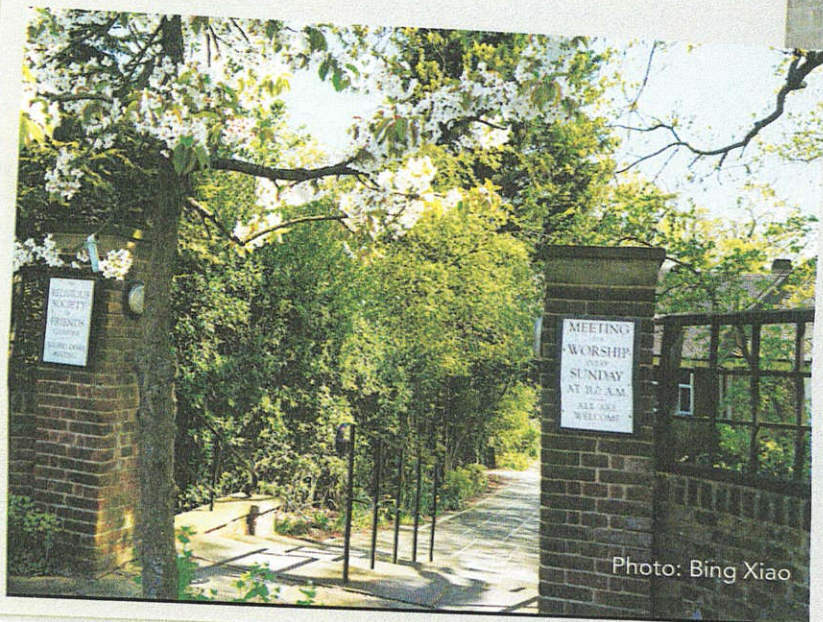
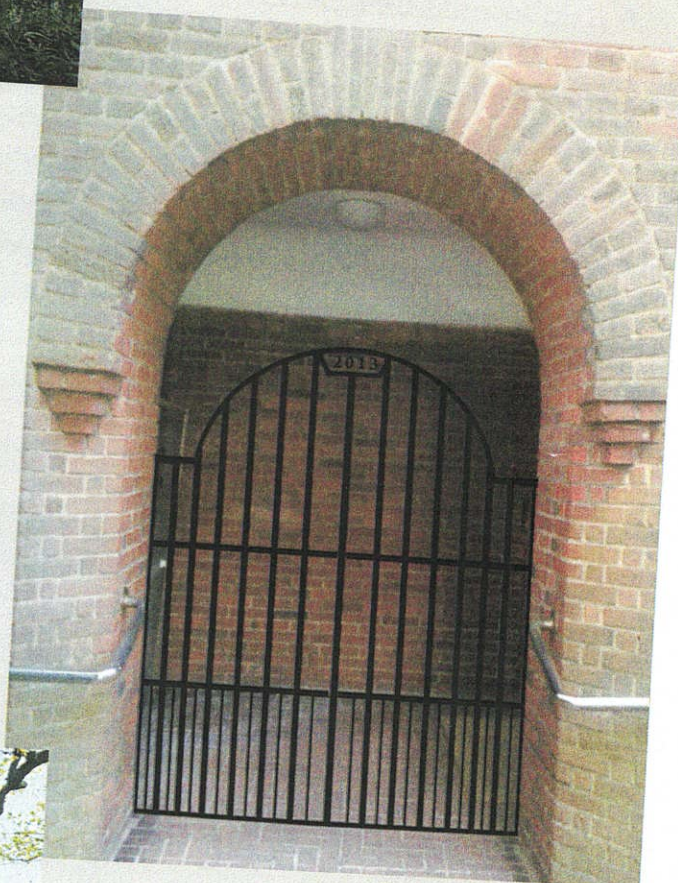
