## NORTHWAY CRICKET

A team representing the Even numbers in Northway, Hampstead Garden Suburb beat a team from the Odd numbers by two wickets with two overs to spare in the ninth annual cricket match on the Heath Extension on Sunday, 28 July. The first Northway cricket match was contested in 1977 to celebrate the Queen's Jubilee and it has been played every year since.

The Odds batted first and made a record 90 for 5 in their 20 allotted overs. Ed Spencer featured in a gritty first wicket stand of 35 before retiring not out to witness the Odds' traditional middle order collapse. David De Saxe's run of bad luck continued with a controversial lbw decision and Simon Lewis departed swiftly after one glorious 4. Seasoned campaigner David Cohen made a sparkling 17 before falling to another smart catch from newcomer Romi and skipper David Lewis was caught valiantly trying to hurry the score along. David Porteous made an invaluable 10 late in the innings.

Following a splendid tea, featuring a very popular chocolate cake from the Festendich family, the Evens set about their run chase. Simon Lewis' fiancée Claire was warmly welcomed as she set

about her fielding with vivacity. Derek Gilmour gave hope to the Odds when he reduced his wicket to firewood but newcomer Ralph Pereira made the day's highest score of 22 not out with some elegant strokes.

Tight bowling by David De Saxe and David Cohen ensured a close finish before Evens Captain Richard Malnick (21 runs) and son Tim (11 runs) cut loose with some free flowing cricket.

It still needed the cool head of Colin Van Gelder batting in a steady drizzle, to steer the Evens home with only 16 balls to spare.

As the hardy spectators dashed for their cars, a rapid presentation saw last year's victorious Captain, David Lewis present the much admired trophy to Evens Captain, Richard Malnick for the seventh time in nine years.

Commenting on the victory, Richard Malnick said "Once again it was a thoroughly enjoyable and sportsmanship match. The annual Northway cricket match continues to survive the vagaries of weather, departures and arrivals in Northway and even weddings. We look forward to renewing the challenge this time next year when we shall be celebrating ten years of Northway cricket." Simon Lewis
