They say that the rehearsals were great fun—and it certainly showed in the performance. It was wonderful to see so many young people acting, singing and dancing with such obvious enjoyment. Such a wealth of talent on display. Terry Rogers is pretty talented himself since he wrote Book, Lyrics and Music of *The Prince and the*

Pauper, performed during February at the Institute, as well as directing the large cast. How he managed to get his actors on and off that tiny stage was quite miraculous.

Once again the costumes were wonderful and one must congratulate Diana Darrer, Frances Musker, Jeanne Solomons and Sue White for the gorgeous dresses of the ladies of the court; the splendid lords, pages, soldiers, celestials and ragged beggars. They all looked very fine against David Rance's ingenious set with its sliding windows and doors. The plot was not always easy to follow as there was a tendency for the music to drown the dialogue, especially where the actors had to speak while the musicians were playing. Could one consider next time moving the musicians behind the action instead of in front of it. Also some of Mr Rogers' witty lyrics were hard to hear, which was a pity. The story of the two boys, one a Prince, the other a Pauper, was well told by the Narrator (Michael Sabine-Bacon) and Edward and Tom were nicely acted by Max Farrell and Richard Barger. Simon Ramsey was truly fearsome as Tom's awful father. Liz Amiel (his wife, Margaret), Louise Rolfe (Bet) and Michelle Steiner (Nan) made the most of a charming song "This Way Tomorrow". It's a wise mother who knows her own child and Margaret certainly knew that Edward was not

her Tom. Not so King Henry who could not see the difference, but it seemed rather strange that the boy's tutor did not notice his lack of Greek. Tom had of course been tutored in Latin by the old priest (another nice cameo by Mortimer Bennitt). Anyway all the court thought that the poor boy was mad. Sister, Mary, had her suspicions and obviously hoped that she would soon be queen. Fiona Riem's cold and proud Mary was an effective contrast to the flame-haired and more voluptuous beauty of Julia Barker's Elizabeth, though the duet they sang so beautifully "Clouds in my Eyes" was hardly in character, considering the scheming that had preceded it.

There were two very amusing performances from Jo Hann as Blind Mildred and from Javaid Punwar as the Archbishop. Miles Hendon, the young man who believed Edward and restored him to his kingdom was played with verve by David Kidd.

The musical director, Tom Morrell and his musicians Robin Gregory, Anna Gregory and Catherine Williams (who also was the singing coach) produced some very pleasing sounds. Kay Graham was assistant director. LS
