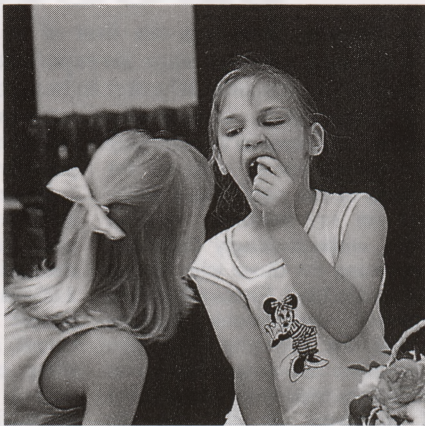

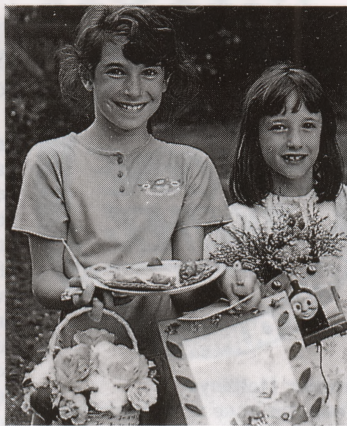
HORTICULTURAL PRIZES

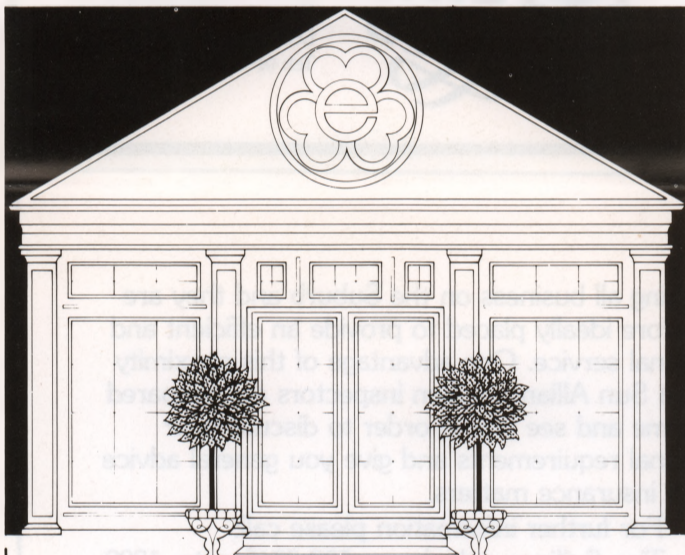

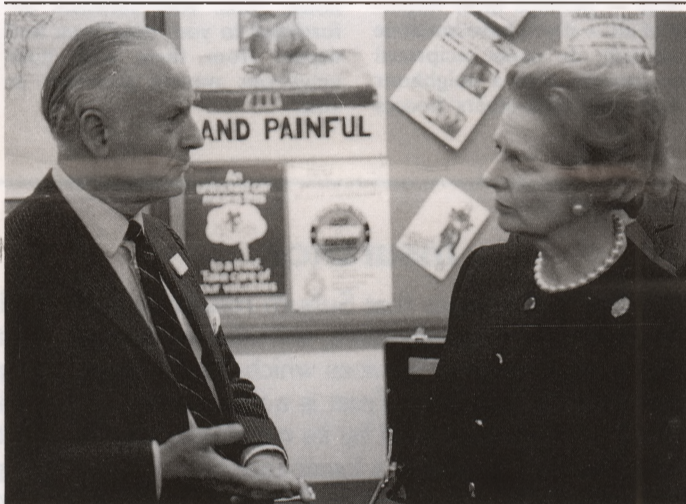
