Tim Neal was applauded for making the shortest statement so far when he reported, for Trees and Open Spaces, only that the third Lutyens Memorial tree to be planted seemed to be thriving.

David Morrison for Consam brought us up to date on Henly's Corner and Falldon Way, Mr Parkinson's decision is imminent; and on Mendels Garage site, the chauffeurs flats may be

demolished and replaced with sheltered housing flats and on Nautilus, against which three enforcement orders had been made but they were all subject to appeal.

Neville Silver thanked Ted Hoblyn, Alan Lawson and yours truly for their work on Publications and announced that after seventeen years of producing the Suburb Directory Ted Hoblyn had decided to hand over to someone else after the next issue. He proposed a vote of thanks.

For the Traffic Committee David Rapson said that Barnet had responded well to requests for repairs to potholes and pavements. He went on to say that all the plans under consideration for London traffic threatened Falldon Way: "Falldon Way split the Suburb in the 20s and still does but the Traffic Committee's aim remains to improve the situation."

Anne Lawson for Wardens and Membership which has been trying for many years to come up with an alternative to the slightly sinister "Warden" has finally decided to call them RA Representatives and the Chief Wardens, Ward Organisers. Perhaps this brave new title will encourage volunteers as "Representatives" are urgently needed in several roads including Northway, Brim Hill, Ossulton Way and Kingsley Way. Eileen Whelan paid tribute to Anne Lawson's committee for starting the successful chess, gourmet and theatre clubs.

The Treasurer, John Boulter, who reported that the reserves of two or three years ago would be down to only £5,000 by the end of the year, in proposing a

suggested subscription of £5. It was over ten years ago that £3 minimum had been set. The motion was "to raise the recommended minimum subscription from 1991 to £5 per household (£1 for senior citizens of limited means).

Jean Henderson moved that the words "of limited means" be deleted from the motion. This was carried.

Gerry Mansell in supporting the motion said that reserves should be built up again in case the recent heavy demand on RA funds should recur.

## Council

No other nominations having been received the officers were re-elected.

New council members elected were: Vanessa Flynn, Coral Sebag-Montefiori, Pauline Silver, Alan Brudney, Dr and Mrs Jaderberg and Russell White.

The Chairman then announced a new category of Honorary Member for those with a record of outstanding service to the Suburb and the RA. The first honorary members were Brigid Grafton-Greene, Jean Henderson, John Enderby, Stuart Gray, Ted Hoblyn and Kit Ikin.



With a vote of thanks to the Chairman the AGM was finally closed at ten o'clock leaving only half an hour for the promised glass of wine and get-together. **RJW**
