

OUTSIDE EDGE

The Garden Suburb Theatre chose Richard Harris's comedy about the fraught relationships in the cricket pavilion for their entry for the 1992 Barnet Drama Festival. They made a good shot at it buy comedy is not as easy as it looks and this play, revealing that all is not as harmonious as it seems between the various couples met together yet again on a Saturday afternoon, needed sharper timing and pace.

Roger, the captain, is very keen to win this match but has difficulty in getting his team to feel the same enthusiasm. Bob is being bullied by his girlfriend to spend the day with her and makes his wife's illness the excuse for not playing. His plans are ruined when his wife, Ginnie, arrives looking extremely well and ready for a nice spell of sun bathing. Poor Kevin hurts his bowling finger, Dennis is willing but hopeless and the team's one good bat Alex has brought along the silliest girl you ever saw who gets locked in the lavatory.

Just as Roger feels he has to do everything himself so his wife, Miriam, renowned for her marvellous teas, feels herself unappreciated and put-upon. The only woman who appears to enjoy herself is Maggie, Kevin's wife, as tall and thin as a beanpole and adoringly protective of her cuddly little husband. This lovely couple were beautifully portrayed by Terry Rogers and Judith Gubbay; there was a real feeling of intimacy

between them and Ms Gubbay knew exactly how to get her laughs and was a joy to watch.

Also good was Caroline Wright as Miriam, the long-suffering wife. Not only has she to provide an endless line of teas but she also suspects a rival in Dorking. There was real pain there at times. When you think about it "Outside Edge" is a very anti-feminist play. All the men, including Kevin, behave badly to their women folk. Bob (Jay Punwar) makes two women unhappy; Dennis (Mike Ash) has a spouse whom we never see who finds solace in trying to buy houses and Alex (Andrew Riley), the public school type, is so awful to poor Sharon (Anna Martin) and she hides all afternoon in his car until her incarceration in the loo. So the humour comes out of discomfort and humiliation and there is not much laughter in that. The only character who produces real mirth is Maggie because she has the upper hand. The play was produced by Marion Greenwood.

Hospice Concert

An evening in the best tradition of cultural events at the Suburb Institute combined recently a Mozart Bicentenary Commemoration with a record support effort for the North London Hospice.

The programme given on 1st February by the Affini Quartet (with Emanuel Hurwitz as guest viola) included the exhilarating C major quintet (K.515). No one present could have wished for a more alert, or dynamically controlled, performance of this gracious, and spacious, piece. As throughout the programme, the leader (Maxi Toszeghi) combined consistently fine tone with great felicity in passage work and impressive command. The ensemble were fortunate in their cellist (Sylvia Southcombe) whose contribution in ensuring a firm foundation and unerring pick-up of pulse at every turn of the music would have been a n object-lesson for many of those who go to the Institute to learn how to play chamber music.

The viola has usually to be content with an occasional

chance to rise to the surface, but the C major offers a whole series of openings and Emanuel and Kay Hurwitz made the most of them all.

The G minor quintet (K.516) in the first half suffered from a too heavy-handed approach in the earlier movements, making the overall effect perhaps more sombre at times than Mozart intended. But this feeling was instantly dispelled with the opening notes of the tripping rondo at the end, its momentum deftly maintained through to the final chords.

Not only the attendance of artists of such high calibre but the remarkable audience turn-out on an icy evening represented a distinguished success for the organisers. The capacity audience of over 200 was skilfully accommodated on floor and stage, along with tables for the buffet supper included in the ticket.

The proceeds of the splendid evening amounted to £2,230. Locally, we have raised a total of £65,000. PAT


Suburb Clubs And Societies
