The RA has been making representations to the Post Office about the rumoured closure of the St George's Road sorting office and have had denials of any such plans. However, sources say that it seems likely that it will be moved to Cricklewood.



You may have wondered what has been going on at the junction of Hampstead Way and Finchley Road. This is the first of a planned series of entry treatments at the main entrances to Hampstead Garden Suburb. The design was developed by English Heritage in conjunction with the London Borough of Barnet, the RA and the Hampstead Garden Suburb Trust. The treatment reflects the design of the original gates at this site. Its purpose is to emphasise to drivers that they are entering a residential area and encourage them to drive more slowly. Further designs will be developed reflecting the individual character of other junctions: Willifield Way/Finchley Road and Addison Way/Finchley Road are the next on English Heritage's list, and they have already been involved in designs for the junction of Ossulton Way and East End Road. RA row with Councillor over hijacked Ward funds

The Residents Association and Councillor Khamisa have, as readers may have gleaned from the local press, been at loggerheads over the installation of parking bays in Hampstead Way that the RA claims have speeded up the traffic and diverted Ward Initiative funds from previously agreed plans for Suburb-wide traffic-calming measures. The RA has the full backing of the Trust Chairman and Council. The background to the row is as follows:

A public meeting chaired by John Marshall MP in November 1991 was overwhelmingly in favour of traffic calming and the need for a 20 mph speed limit for the Suburb. It was agreed that, for such schemes to work, it was essential to deal with the whole area and not merely one or two black spots. Safeguarding one residential road by itself would

simply force traffic on to adjoining residential roads.

The RA Roads and Traffic Committee then took the lead in developing the skeleton of a comprehensive scheme for the whole Suburb - which scheme has been accepted by Barnet and by all concerned.

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TRUST FAILS TO ANSWER

The AGM of the Hampstead Garden Suburb Trust has, of late, become a forum for vigorous debate on the manner in which the Trust's financial affairs are managed. This year's meeting on 13 September was no exception, despite the greater degree of clarity with which they are now presented. Following introductory remarks by the Chairman, Eddie Caplin, he welcomed members and guests, in particular ex-Chairman Gerry Mansell and John Marshall, MP.

Questions were asked on a number of points raised by the Annual Report, including the

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RA Report

There are three vital bodies concerned with the protection and interests of Hampstead Garden Suburb - the HGS Trust, London Borough of Barnet, and the HGS Residents Association (our voice). It is a matter of great regret when there is any lack of co-operation, as in the recent action taken by Councillor Khamisa in disregarding the agreed Traffic Calming plans previously agreed between all three of us. It is very important that residents contact the relevant RA Standing Committee about their problems before approaching our Councillors or the press. Our committees do need to know of your concerns.

Colin Gregory gave the RA Council an excellent report on the Annual Civic Trust Conference he attended at Port Sunlight, which is a garden village near Liverpool. It outlined the importance of promoting a good quality of urban environment, and how do we all stand on just two of the points - promoting a sense of community and less reliance on cars?

There has been a large promotion for the consultative process on the City of London's Management Plans for Hampstead Heath, and in July Paul Canneaux, Superintendent of Hampstead Heath, came to give an

informative talk to the RA Council and answer questions. Our own Trees and Open Spaces Committee have given very full and considered comments in response.

'Friends of Northway Gardens' held a meeting to launch a very worthwhile scheme.

We are happy to report that Tina and Bill Bailey have accepted the invitation for Honorary Life Membership, which we are hoping they will receive at the next AGM in March 1995.

Another date for next year will be 24-25 June, for our next Suburb Weekend, which was such a success last year.


