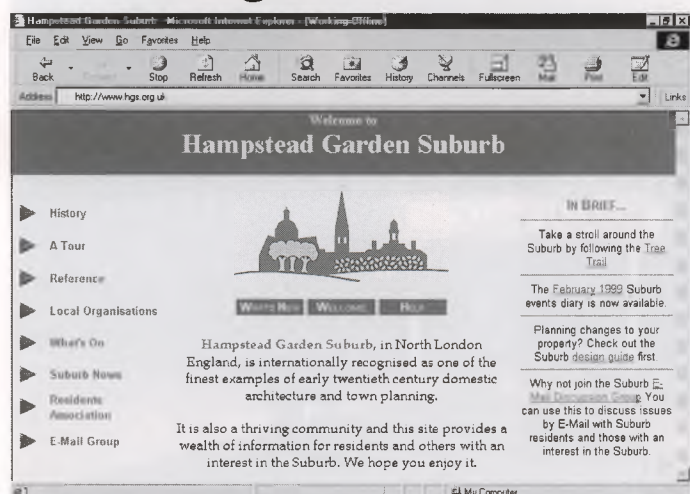


HGS goes Hi-Tech!



This year a select band of Suburb residents have been swapping information and discussing issues which affect them. They belong to a new free service called the HGS E Mail Discussion List which has been set up by Corringway resident Steve Morris.

They have also seen an illustrated version of Georgina Malcolm's Tree Trail leaflet (available from the Suburb Gallery) and now complete with colour photographs of all the 36 trees seen at their very best at the Suburb Internet web site at www.hgs.org.uk.

There's lots of information about the Suburb at our web site, its history and current events and organisations on the site. But if you want to communicate with others as well as view information, then the E Mail Discussion List is well worth joining.

The List works through the Internet. With E Mail you transmit a letter electronically from a

computer in your home or office through an ordinary phone line to another computer.

Normally an E Mail is delivered to just one recipient. With the E Mail Discussion List the E mail is sent to the list which then redistributes it to all the other members. Eventually all 5,000 households in the Suburb could become members. At the moment we are fewer than 50.

The list can be very helpful. You can advertise things you want to buy and sell on a non-commercial basis. Or just ask for help. Someone was recommended a paving contractor. Another advertised her car for sale. We've had people wanting to sell, let and find accommodation on the Suburb.

Or people just post comments or ask questions. We have discussed traffic calming, children's activities in Central Square, cyclists and so on.

To join the list you need a computer with a modem (most new ones have one included)

and a connection to the Internet.

Internet connections can cost anything from £5 to £15 a month. However you can get it free if you sign up for a service called Freeserve. Ask for the Freeserve CD at a branch of Dixons, PC World or The Link. Freeserve needs a computer with a CD drive and runs Windows 95 or 98. I've used it for several months and there is no catch.

If you don't run Windows 95, the next best bet is BT Click which charges 1p a minute (in addition to a local call which you need to pay for all connections for Internet Access) which is added to the phone bill you are dialling from.

You don't need to register for BT Click but you will have to set up an E mail address, which is also free. There are also other free service providers but you have to be on line already to get access to them. These charge an ordinary local call charge, not the 1p a minute extra which BT Click does.

So once you are on-line, make your first port of call the Hampstead Garden Suburb Web Site at www.hgs.org.uk where you can join the E Mail Discussion List.

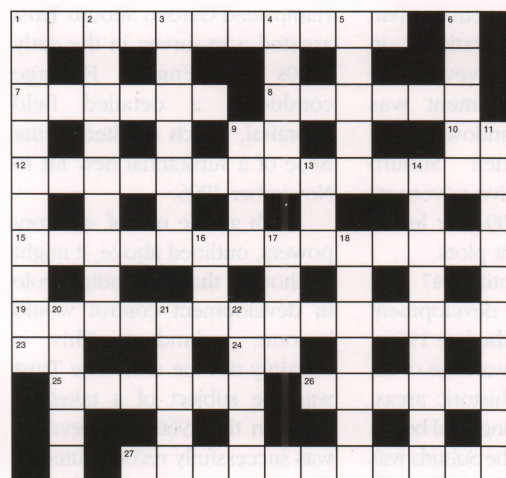
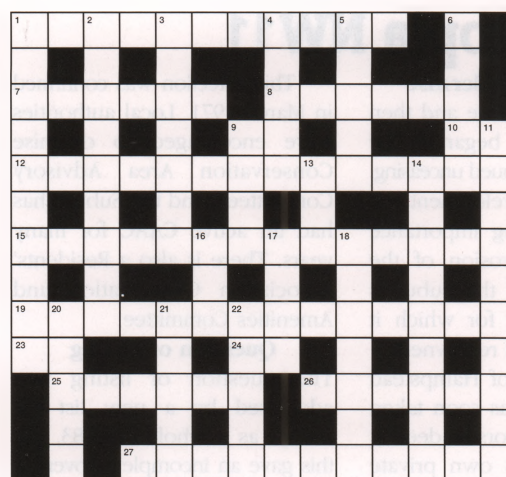

RIBA, the RTPI and the Victorian Society. The Trust has its own Manager, Christopher Kellerman, and Architect, David Pickles. The Scheme of Management requires the submission of applications for Trust Landlord Consent parallel to, but by no means identical with, the statutory planning process. Applications are brought before a Property and Plans Committee and its recommendations are referred to the full Trust Council for final decision.
