Working for a safer neighbourhood

The Garden Suburb Safer Neighbourhood Team (SNT) has been in existence for just over two years. In that time we have met a quite a few residents in a number of different circumstances. This has been whilst out on patrol, at street briefings or surgeries or some of the Community events such as Proms and Centenary Celebrations last year.

A large part of what we do is governed by the priorities set by the Community Action Partnership (CAP). We meet with this group every two months. It is made up of residents, members of the Residents Association and Neighbourhood Watch. Our current priorities are:

Burglary – we have met some residents in circumstances less pleasant than those described above, when they have been victims of this crime. As well as advising on security we have directed our patrols to affected areas. Some good arrests have resulted when sharp-eyed residents have dialled 999 when seeing individuals acting in a suspicious way in the vicinity of their neighbours.

Motor vehicle crime – As well as patrolling areas especially known for this, we have advised a number of people about leaving valuables on display in their vehicles.

Anti-Social behaviour by motorists – This is perhaps the most wide-ranging priority and affects most people in some shape or form. For some time we have operated a speed gun on the Finchley Road on a couple of days every month. A number of motorists have been warned and several tickets issued. Where

there have been complaints about speeding elsewhere we have liaised with Barnet Council which has have installed sensors to quantify the matter. This is under constant review.
